Thank you all those who were involved in any way with our 100 year Remembrance of the end of WWI. To approach the church past 18 'guns', one for each life lost in that war, then to see poppies draped from the tower and covering the porch took one's breath away. The displays in church were likewise creative and inspiring. We welcomed 60 people to our service on the 11th of November, which included members of families who were relatives of 10 of those named on our monument. The refreshments and lunches, and the display in the Village Hall after the service gave all the opportunity to get together and reflect. The lighting of the "Beacon of Hope" at 7 p.m. (with a welcome glass of Sloe Gin to toast the 18) rounded off the day respectfully. **Dave Ireland writes** - The thing I was worried about when moving to Suffolk was the possible loss of good bird watching. How wrong was I! The first surprise was to see three Demoiselle Cranes by Lady's bridge. I'm not certain if it was the same three I saw last year in Norfolk, but what a nice surprise and the surprises keep coming. A Nightingale and Kingfisher in our back garden, a Bullfinch pair in the grounds of Moat House and a wonderful sighting of at least thirty or more Skylarks eating corn after the years' harvest. A female Golden Oriole in early spring (the male is black and yellow and is the size of a blackbird). Little Owls sitting on the power cable coming up from Rickinghall. A Barn Owl hunting on the field in Bells Lane most mornings during spring this year. Tawny Owls calling in late autumn in the hope of moving their young on to new areas. Short Ear Owl spotted along the valley next to the fishing lakes and only last week forty or more Red Leg Partridges on the fields by the fishing lakes as well. At this time, on the right hand field off Gobbits Lane (where the sun flowers have been grown) you could be lucky enough to see Siskins, Corn Buntings, Yellow Hammers and Bramblings, as well as many other species feeding on the flower seeds - wonderful sights.
